This is the set up for the round.  This speech is 100% written out, hopefully as close to 6 minutes as possible.  Standardly, this speech contains definitions, a value and value criterion, and contentions supporting the resolution.	In this section of the debate, the Negative asks the Affirmative questions about the case that was just read. Questions can also be asked that traps the AFF into agreeing with NEg ase.  In this section, it's important to remember that we're asking questions, not arguing.	This speech should be split into two parts:  The first half of this speech is about setting up your negative case, which will negate the resolution. That will include your value and criterion, as well as contentions.  The second half of this speech is refuting AFF's claims made in the first speech. Ideally, you want to do this line-by-line, taking each point and subpoint and refuting them individually (or grouping arguments, if possible).	In this section of the debate, the Affirmative asks the NEG questions about the case that was just read. Questions can also be asked that traps the Neg into agreeing with AFF case.	This speech is about the refutation of the NEG case and responses to things that AFF said about neg case. Remember, going in order of the arguments as they are written is the best way to make sure the judge doesn't miss anything.	In this speech, the NEG refutes the AFF arguments.	No new evidence in this speech, only extensions on evidence already stated.
